Eliminating Raw Sewage Across the Country




Nationally:

- Since 2013, EPA have identified 50 areas where raw sewage has been entering the environment for decades.
- At the end of 2022, raw sewage was eliminated in 21 of these areas through the building of new wastewater infrastructure.
- 65% of total volume of raw sewage has been eliminated by prioritising areas that make biggest impact.
- We are on track to eliminate the vast majority of raw sewage discharges by the end of 2025 with a total investment of €750 million.

Raw Sewage projects in Cork:

- Works in Castletownbere & Inchigeelagh now complete;
- Works in Whitegate-Aghada and Castletownshend underway;
- Works in Ballycotton due to commence in coming weeks



Ballycotton Sewerage Scheme



Working in partnership with Cork County Council, construction on the Ballycotton Sewerage Scheme will commence in April 2023. Mobilisation on site will commence in March.

This project involves the construction of a new wastewater treatment plant and sewerage infrastructure.

This project will eliminate the discharge of untreated wastewater into Ballycotton Bay.

It is being delivered by Glan Agua on behalf of Uisce Éireann



Problem Being Solved



- Currently, untreated sewage is being discharged at two location into Ballycotton Bay.
- This practice is unacceptable and is not in compliance with EU Urban Waste Water Treatment Directive.
- The Ballycotton Sewerage Scheme project will eliminate the discharge of the equivalent of 860 wheelie bins of raw sewage per day being discharged into Ballycotton Bay.



Benefits of the Project




The new wastewater treatment plant will bring benefits to Ballycotton:

- Improved water quality in Ballycotton Bay.
- Protection of recreational waters for swimming, boating and sightseeing.



- Cleaner water will enhance local amenities and act as a platform for social and economic development.
- New wastewater treatment plant, sewer pipes and pumping stations sized to accommodate future population growth.
- Ensure compliance with national and EU regulations relating to the treatment of wastewater.





What is involved in the project?



- A new treatment plant serving a population equivalent of 1082, located on a site to the South-West of Ballycotton Main Street.
- Provision of a new below ground pumping station on Ballycotton Pier. This pumping station will transfer wastewater to a second pumping station on Cow Lane via a rising main and then a gravity sewer.
- A new below ground pumping station on Cow Lane. This pumping station will transfer wastewater to the proposed treatment plant via a rising main.
- 1400m of new pipeline to transfer wastewater.
- Provision of a new 440m long pipe will carry treated wastewater from the plant to the existing outfall, adjacent to Cow Lane, for safe discharging to Ballycotton Bay.


Timeline:

The main works are due to commence in April 2023. The scheme is due for completion by Summer 2024 with the majority of construction works to be complete by early 2024.



Location of Project Works






Video: Sequence of Works & Traffic Management


































FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)



Will traffic be a problem in the area during the construction?

- Our aim will be to minimise the impact on traffic in Ballycotton during construction of the scheme. However, pipelaying in the village will cause disruption and this will be managed by careful traffic management planning and by clear communication with residents and businesses affected.
- A traffic management plan (TMP) has been prepared in collaboration with Cork County Council. All
 works will be programmed in the least disruptive way, avoiding the busy tourist seasons with road
 works planned from October onwards.
- Advanced traffic management warning signage will be in place.
- Local and emergency access will always be maintained.

Will the construction and operation of project generate any odours?

• The management of odours in the sewer, pumping stations and WWTP has been taken into account as part of detailed project design. Odour treatment units and ventilation systems will be installed to ensure that the infrastructure does not generate any malodours or nuisance.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)



How will noise issues be managed during construction?

- To minimise noise, construction works will be undertaken:
 - Monday to Friday 7.00am to 7.00pm.
 - Saturday 8:00am to 4:30pm.
 - No operation on Sundays or Bank Holidays.
- Any works that take place outside these hours, will require advance permission from Uisce Éireann
- Fencing will be put in place around the construction of pumping stations and WWTP.
- Noise suppression equipment will be utilised for machinery where possible.

How will dust issues be managed during construction?

- Hard surface roads shall be regularly cleaned and maintained as appropriate to remove mud and aggregate materials.
- Dampening down / spraying shall be used as required
- Stockpiling of materials shall be laid out to minimise exposure to wind.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)



Will this project impact the marine environment, local beaches and fishing?

 This project will end the practice of raw sewage being discharged to the marine environment. It will improve water quality, protect public health and lead to a more enjoyable environment for local communities while enhancing the amenity value of the local area.

How can I connect into the new sewerage scheme?

 Any person or business wishing to get a new connection to public wastewater collection infrastructure must contact Uisce Éireann. You can make a preconnection enquiry, which is a free service, in order to establish the feasibility of a connection to the Uisce Éireann public network.
